Dear Heronfield Families,

My family celebrated Chinese New Year this weekend by ordering in from one of our favorite places, and I was reminded of a time a year ago when we joined our neighbors for a feast at the restaurant itself last year (remember those days?). The many entrees were arrayed on the table, and as we all leaned in to fill our plates, seven year-old Allie asked me about an unknown vegetable in a certain dish. When I said I didn't know what it was, she sort of shrugged and replied, "I don't know either. So I guess we'll just have to 'not know' together." With that, she grabbed the serving spoon and added a portion to her plate, more than willing to try something new, something unknown.

Even at her young age, Allie is a bit of a philosopher, so it's not surprising that she might say something that would sit softly on the mind, and I've been thinking a bit about the idea of 'not knowing together' since then. Schools are too often places where a teacher knows the information and shares it out with the students in a pre-planned way, certain exactly what the students will learn and how they will show their learning today, tomorrow and the day after that. We see this around the Harkness table as a student might find a new angle to a novel that a teacher has taught several years before. We see this as students squint into a microscope and discover the multitude of organisms in a drop of pond water. A new solution in a math class, an appreciation for a new-found connection to another culture, an interesting way to connect an event from history to something from the morning's news report. As with much of life, both teaching and learning occur best when they are truly authentic, when we leave ourselves open to what we might discover, what ideas might come in just the right moments, and how we will share and build on what we know with others.

It's a time of celebration these days, with Chinese New Year, Valentine's Day, and even Mardi Gras falling in a short span, and while the ways we celebrate holidays might be different, I hope we can continue to truly celebrate the many ways that we approach the days we share, the many ways that we revel in 'not knowing together' and then put our minds together to figure things out, develop new ideas, and let life unfold in interesting ways. This year has emphasized the importance of being flexible and adapting to whatever might occur. It's not always easy, but we sure learn a lot in the process, together, which is indeed worth celebrating.
